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


Greenhouse Gas Inventories 2022






Sectoral Ceilings (2021-2025)






Greenhouse Gas Projections

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






1. A changing climate

2. Climate futures and their impacts

The future climate is in our collective hands.

To halt warming globally and in Ireland requires rapidly reaching at least netzero Carbon Dioxide emissions and substantially cutting other greenhouse gas emissions.

Every action matters: with every additional increment of warming, impacts for Ireland will increase substantially

3. Delivering a climate neutral Ireland

Having peaked in 2001, Ireland's greenhouse gas emissions have reduced in all sectors except agriculture.

Ireland currently emits more greenhouse gases per person than the EU average.


A legal basis for deep, rapid and sustained national emissions cuts now exists, although current policy and action remain insufficient to meet these aims.

The pathway forward is clearer for energy, transport and the built environment than for agriculture and land use. For all sectors there are many challenges to overcome.

Effective and just transformative actions will have mitigation and adaptation benefits and bring broader benefits for health, wellbeing, nature and sustainable economic development.


The state has a central role to play, supported through action across society.













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Climate Change in the Irish Mind
